We have reviewed the accompanying financial statements of Inspiration Ministries, Inc. (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of assets, liabilities and net assets – modified cash basis as of December 31, 2020, and the related statements of support, revenue, expenses and change in net assets – modified cash basis, and functional expenses – modified cash basis for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements. A review includes primarily applying analytical procedures to management's financial data and making inquiries of management. A review is substantially less in scope than an audit, the objective of which is the expression of an opinion regarding the financial statements as a whole. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion.

We believe that the results of our procedures provide a reasonable basis for our conclusion.

#### 1. ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### **Organization**

Inspiration Ministries, Inc. (Organization) exists to help people transform their lives in times of transition. The Organization's programs allow opportunity for people to identify that their pasts and presents do not have to define their future.

#### **Taxes**

The Organization is exempt from income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and has been classified as an organization that is not a private foundation under Section 509(a) of the Internal Revenue Code. However, under certain Internal Revenue Code regulations, profitable, unrelated business income is subject to federal and state income tax. Such income arises from the Cupbearer café sales.

#### **Basis of Accounting**

The Organization's policy is to prepare its financial statements on the modified cash basis of accounting; consequently, certain revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when cash is disbursed rather than when the obligation is incurred. Modifications to the cash basis include recognition of fixed assets and related depreciation, sales tax payable, refundable advances, and notes payable. This basis differs from generally accepted accounting principles primarily because the Organization has not recognized accounts receivables, accounts payable, and accruals and their related effects on net assets in the accompanying financial statements.

#### **Estimates**

The process of preparing financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the use of estimates and assumptions regarding certain types of assets, liabilities, revenues, and expenses. Such estimates primarily relate to unsettled transactions and events as of the date of the financial statements. Accordingly, upon settlement, actual results may differ from estimated amounts.

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less at the time of purchase to be cash equivalents.

#### 1. ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### **Property and Equipment**

Property and equipment is stated at cost or, in the case of contributed assets, at their fair market values at the date of receipt. Property and equipment with a cost or donated value of \$5,000 or more and a useful life of one or more years are capitalized and depreciated over the estimated useful lives of the related assets. Depreciation is computed on the straight-line method.

#### **Net Assets**

Net assets without donor restrictions are available for use at the discretion of the Organization's management and the board of directors. From time to time the board designates a portion of these net assets for specific purposes, which makes them unavailable for use at management's discretion.

Net assets with donor restrictions consist of assets whose use is limited by donor-imposed time and/or purpose restrictions. The Organization reports gifts of cash and other assets as revenue with donor restrictions if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, the net assets are reclassified as net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions.

#### **In-kind Contributions**

No amounts have been reported in the financial statements for donated services because they do not meet the accounting guidelines for reporting; however, a substantial number of volunteers donate significant amounts of time in providing the Organization's services.

#### **Functional Allocation of Expense**

The costs of providing the Organization's programs and supporting services have been summarized on a functional basis in the statements of activities. The statement of functional expenses presents the natural classification detail of expenses by function. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the program services and supporting activities benefited.

The financial statements report certain categories of expenses that are attributed to more than one program or supporting function. Therefore, expenses require allocation on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied. Expenses allocated based on time and effort include salaries and related expenses. Depreciation is allocated based on square footage.

#### **Subsequent Events**

Management has evaluated subsequent events through February 19, 2021, the date which the financial statements were available for issue.

#### 3. ECONOMIC INJURY DISASTER LOAN

On May 23, 2020, the Organization obtained an Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) from the Small Business Administration in the amount of \$150,000. Monthly payments of \$641, including principal and interest at 2.75% will begin 12 months from the date of the promissory note with the outstanding balance due 30 years from the date of the promissory note. The loan is secured by all tangible and intangible personal property of the Organization.

#### 6. GOVERNMENT GRANTS

The Organization received a \$40,600 loan from the Small Business Administration (SBA) as a part of the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) through the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Securities (CARES) Act. The loan was uncollateralized and was fully guaranteed by the Federal government. The Organization initially recorded the loan as a fundable advance and subsequently recognized grant revenue in accordance with guidance for conditional contributions; that is, once the measurable performance or other barrier and right of return of the loan no longer existed. The Organization has recognized \$40,600 as grant revenue for the year ended December 31, 2020.

The Organization also received an EIDL Advance in the amount \$10,000 during 2020 which was recorded in grants.

#### 7. ADVERTISING

Marketing costs are charged to operations as incurred and totaled \$3,130 for 2020.

#### 8. OPERATING LEASE

In December 2020, the Organization entered into an operating lease with an option to purchase for facility space. The eighteen-month lease begins January 2021 and requires monthly payments of \$3,000 with an option to purchase of \$525,000.

#### 9. RELATED PARTIES

During 2020, the Organization repaid a loan in the amount of \$5,000 to the CEO and President of the Organization.

Also during 2020, the Organization repaid a loan in the amount of \$15,000 to the COO and Vice President/Chairman of the Board of the Organization and purchased a vehicle from the individual in the amount of \$3,000.

#### 10. RISK AND CONCENTRATIONS

On March 11, 2020, the COVID-19 virus had been declared a global pandemic. The extent of the impact of the COVID-19 outbreak on the financial performance of the Organization will depend on future developments, including the duration and severity of the outbreak and its impact on the overall economy. Management is carefully monitoring the situation and evaluating its options during this time. No adjustments have been made to these financial statements as a result of this uncertainty.
